Gener	General observations and summary of the site:								

Site summary

- The products manufactured at this site were lights.
- Overall responsibility for meeting the standards was taken by Ms. Xu Julin/ HR Manager.
- There was a total of 58 employees on site (52 were migrant employees and 6 were local employees, there were 53 permanent employees and 5 contracting workers (security guards)). Migrant employees were mainly from Hunan and Guangxi Province.
- The youngest employee on site was 19 years old.
- There was a worker committee at this facility. One worker representative was present during the audit in the opening meeting, facility tour and closing meeting.
- There was evidence of both male and female in management and among supervisor. The distribution was Male 70%, Female 30%.
- The peak month was not obvious per information from management.



- 10 employees were randomly selected for interview including 6 male employees and 4 female employees, 6 employees were selected for the individual interview and 4 employees in one group were selected for the group interview.
- Payrolls for the period from November 2018 to October 2019 and attendance records for the period from 1st November 2018 to 16th December 2019 were provided for review. Randomly sampled 10 employees' payrolls and attendance records from October 2019 (current month), June 2019 (random month) and March 2019 (random month) for further checking on status of wages and working hours.
- Based on the provided attendance records, standard working hours in this facility were 8 hours per day, 40 hours per week with at least 1 day off in a week.
- Based on the provided attendance records and payrolls, the facility paid 150% overtime rate to the employee who overtime in the normal working day which was meet the local law requirement. The overtime working was paid correctly.
- Based on the provided attendance records, the status of overtime hours in sample was as below:
 - 48-101 hours/month in October 2019 (current month)
 - 56-112 hours/month in June 2019 (random month)
 - 56-118 hours/month in March 2019 (random month)

- 3. Safety and Hygienic Conditions
- 3.1 Lack of exit sign. During facility tour, auditor found that no exit sign was installed over one safety exit on the roof at the dormitory building.
- 3.2 Lack of emergency light. During facility tour, auditor found that no emergency light was installed at one safety exit on the roof at the dormitory building.
- 3.3 Only copy of report of construction completion acceptance was provided. During facility tour, auditor found that there were one 3-storey and one 4-storey building. However, the facility only provided the copy of the report of construction completion acceptance of these buildings for review.
- 3.4 Insufficient certificate or report/register for fire protection acceptance was provided. During facility tour, auditor found that there were one 3-storey and one 4-storey building. However, the facility could not provide the certificate or report/register for fire protection acceptance for the 4/F of one 4-storey building for review.
- 3.5 No training records / certificate of management skill for the principal in charge in the facility. During document review, auditor found that the facility could not provide the training records / certificate of management skill of the principal in charge for review.
- 5. Living Wages and Benefits
- 5.1 Insufficient social insurance participated.



- 1) Through reviewing social insurance receipt of December 2019, auditor found there were total 53 direct employees and 5 contracting workers (security guards) in the facility, but only 43 direct employees had participated in basic endowment insurance and unemployment insurance; 51 direct employees had participated in basic medical insurance; 47 direct employees had participated in employment injury insurance and maternity insurance. There were 5 contracting workers (security guards) working in the facility, but no social insurance document was provided for review, hence, the social insurance status of 5 contracting workers (security guards) could not be verified.
- 6. Working hours
- 6.1 Overtime hours exceeded the legal requirement. Through document review, auditors found that the monthly overtime hours of 10 out of 10 employees were 48-101 hours in October 2019 (current month); the monthly overtime hours of 10 out of 10 employees were 56-112 hours in June 2019 (random month); the monthly overtime hours of 10 out of 10 employees were 56-118 hours in March 2019 (random month).
- 6.2 Total weekly hours exceeded the requirement of client. Through document review, auditor found that total working hours per week of 3 out of 10 randomly selected employees were 66 hours per week in October 2019 (current month); 66 hours per week in June 2019 (random month), which exceeded 60 hours.

Total 10 employees were selected for interview. 6 employees were selected for the individual interview and 4 employees in 1 group were selected for the group interview. Through employees' interviews, all employees were satisfied with the facility's working environment and salary level, no negative information was raised.

One worker representative was selected to interview. The employee was favourable with the management and facility environment, and no negative information was raised.

The management was cooperative throughout the process of the audit. The documentations requested were provided for review timely. All areas were allowed access for tour, and a private room was provided for employees' interview. During closing meeting, the managements were receptive to all findings and stated that they would make improvement for all raised findings continually.


